In conversation with director Jeremy Herrin

An extract from the Best of Enemies West End programme.

Best of Enemies is an unknown story that can shed light on the current state of political discourse, particularly in America, but also here in the UK. William F. Buckley Jr. and Gore Vidal are smart, entertaining and contradictory characters.

I think we are in a moment of flux similar to 1968. A lot of the questions that are exercising us now remain unresolved from the period of the play. It's a time-honoured tradition of drama to try and understand the present through the prism of the past, and I hope people will enjoy getting to know these two vivid characters and the world they inhabited, and question how it might talk to what's going on now.

I'd love audiences to be surprised at how entertaining this show was. Feeling more connected to each other; having had a chance to feel surprising things about these surprising characters, at this surprising time. I wonder if audiences will feel there might be a better way to represent politics on TV? Or is it too late for that?
