

From Tredegar to Westminster

An extract from Neil Kinnock's programme article for Nye

Unlike most others, Bevan could be compelling in all of the public arenas. He excelled in the tumult of a crowded Commons or in the conversational close combat of a Standing Committee. He commanded conference platforms and was compelling at party rallies or on the Trafalgar Square plinth, winning against hecklers, the elements and primitive tannoy systems.

His voice was not sonorous. Its tone and rhythm flowed with his vocabulary and emphasis. His forward-leaning body and jabbing forefinger carried the same current. From the dark depths of soft solemnity he would rise very gradually, through a fusillade of illustrations and - with a warning grin -

jokes, to a crescendo of incredulity, scorn and demand for action. The occasional sibilant stutter would add to the machine-gun delivery and then, having given the moral or message, he would ram it home with a forceful damning, dismissive or revelatory conclusion. He could use honeved charm or rhetorical acid, deploy understatement and risk abusive overstatement, be reconciling and impulsive, demonise and satirise.

All the time he sought to give effect to his credo that a political leader in a democracy 'must articulate the wants, the frustrations, the aspirations of the masses. Their hearts must be moved by his words, and so his words must be attuned to their realities'.


